Girl Scouts and Faith

Everything in Girl Scouts is based on the Girl Scout Promise and Law, which includes many of the principles and values common across religions. While a secular organization, Girl Scouts encourages girls to take spiritual journeys via their faith's religious recognitions and by earning the My Promise, My Faith pin, which helps deepen the connection between the Girl Scout Law and a girl's faith.

Faith can be intensely personal and specific—two people can share the same religion but practice it very differently. Girl Scouts enables girls to honor their spiritual journey in a way that's authentic to their faith. Girls of all faiths can honor their spirituality and embrace the diversity of the Girl Scout Movement. See Girl Scouts and Faith.

Girl Scout Awards: My Promise, My Faith

Girl Scouts of the USA developed the My Promise, My Faith (MPMF) Awards in 2011.
Girls in grades K-12 can earn one award pin per year by exploring the Girl Scout Law. MPMF Awards complement religious recognitions for



specific faiths and help girls strengthen their faith through Girl Scouts.

Faith Events

Girl Scouts of Orange County encourages girls to hold faith events to connect with their faith community! Girls will deepen their faith, strengthen relationships, and gain event planning skills! Events can happen during Girl Scout Week in March or any time of year! Girls and adults use this Faith Program Toolkit to plan a faith event.

Girl Scout Week is celebrated the week of Girl Scouts' Birthday, March 12, and includes Girl Scout Sunday, Girl Scout Jummah, and Girl Scout Shabbat/Sabbath. Partnering with faith communities during Girl Scout Week exposes more people in the community to the benefits of Girl Scouts, affirms relationships with faith leaders and adult volunteers, and builds the Movement's diversity Click here to view this year's info.

Team Up with Faith Partners

Girl Scouts partner with and celebrate faith communities – during Girl Scout Week and throughout the year, to recognize Girl Scouts in their place of worship, share the benefits of Girl Scouting with faith families, and thank faith partners for their support. Celebrations with faith partners support membership, programming, and community engagement goals.

Celebrations can be hosted by girls and adults, especially faith-based troops, and celebrated with any faith partner.

GSOC Girl Scout Week celebration dates in 2023 include:

- Girl Scout Birthday and <u>Trefoil Trot</u>: Sunday March 12, 2023
- Girl Scout Jummah: Friday March 17, 2023
- Girl Scout Sabbath/Shabbat: Friday March 17 Saturday March 18, 2023
- Girl Scout Sunday: Sunday, March 19, 2023

Faith Partner Relationships

Faith partners have been working with Girl Scouts since 1912 to reach out to communities and serve girls and families. Some ways that faith partners can work with Girl Scouts include hosting a troop, engaging Girl Scouts in service opportunities, and helping girls earn their My Promise, My Faith pin and religious recognitions.

How to Plan a Faith Event

Use the questions below to start planning!

Who will plan the faith event?

Girls and adults should decide the following:

- 1. **Who** will participate in the faith event? **Who** will take the lead on planning the faith event?
- 2. What will the faith event include?
- 3. When will the faith event take place?
- 4. Where will the faith event be held?
- 5. **How** will the faith event be organized?
- 6. **Why** is the faith event important?

Faith Event Planning Guide

Who will participate in the faith event?

Girls can plan an event for Girl Scout members, families, or the larger faith community. Possible options include:

- Girl Scout Troop, Sister Troops, or Service Unit
- Girl Scout Region or Council
- Church, Mosque, Temple, or other congregation
- School Community
- Other Audience

Note: Planning Large Events Training is for any volunteer who is running an event for their Service Unit, a group of troops (over 4 troops) or Council-wide. A large event is broadly defined as any event organized by Girl Scouts generally for Girl Scouts. This training is also useful for Service Unit team members who are helping to coordinate Service Unit events.

Who will take the lead on planning the faith event?

Girls can take the lead on planning using the "girl led" process with the guidance of adults to plan a faith event. Those planning can include:

- Girls
- Troop Leader or other Girl Scout Adult
- Faith leaders

What will the faith event include?

Girls can help determine what the faith event will include depending on when, where, and how it will be organized. Some examples include:

- Girl Scout Faith Awards Event
 - o Activities to earn My Promise, My Faith Awards OR Religious Recognitions
 - Snack
 - Guest Speaker Panel representing different faith backgrounds
 - Ceremony
- Faith Worship Service/Girl Scout Week Faith Observance: Girl Scout Sunday,
 Jummah, Shabbat (see Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith Flyers and PPT Slide Inserts)
 - Activities before the service (see Pre- and Post-Service Ideas)

Where will the faith event be held?

- Church, Mosque, Temple, or other place of worship
- School
- Park
- Beach

How will the faith event be organized?

A faith event can be planned as:

- a workshop for current and/or new Girl Scouts
- a celebration during Girl Scout Week: Girl Scout Sunday, Girl Scout Jummah, Girl Scout Shabbat
- an opportunity for Girl Scouts to share their faith and/or learn about the faith traditions of others (ie. Girl Scouts Celebrate Hanukkah, Open Mosque Day, etc.)
- a part of a worship service at a place of worship
- a prayer service or Girl Scout's Own ceremony
- an interfaith celebration (see the virtual Interfaith Event Series linked on <u>Girl Scouts</u> and <u>Faith</u> for inspiration)
- a reception to thank faith leaders for providing meeting space and/or support

Why host a faith event?

Girls can hold a faith event to:

- earn the Girl Scout My Promise, My Faith Awards OR religious recognitions for specific faiths
- celebrate Girl Scout Week in March during the week of Girl Scout Birthday, March
 12th
- celebrate a religious season or holiday
- invite new members to join Girl Scouts
- share an achievement or community service project and/or present an award
- build relationships by sharing how they live the Girl Scout Promise and Law

Tips for Planning a Memorable Event during Girl Scout Week and beyond!

- 1. **Work closely with your faith partner.** Teaming up will help event planning and promotion go smoothly and deepen the connection between your troop and your faith partner.
- 2. **Start early.** Houses of worship will appreciate the extra time to incorporate your event into their worship schedule!
- 3. **Include pre- and post-activities.** Events before and after the worship service are a great way to share the benefits of Girl Scouting with faith families and give back to your faith partner. You might host a cookie booth and/or cookies and punch reception after the service or do a service project—check out the activities tip sheet for ideas.
- 4. **Promote your event.** Spread the word through social media and neighborhood channels. Ask your faith partner to promote the event in their newsletters or bulletins. And give your local council a heads up too: they may amplify through their channels.
- 5. **Thank your faith partner after the event.** Faith partners will appreciate a note of thanks after your event, especially one they can share with their community.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What is Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith?

Girl Scouts of the USA has longstanding traditions of celebrating with faith communities during Girl Scout Week. Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith events are celebrations to recognize Girl Scouts at their house of worship, thank faith partners for their support throughout the year, and honor Girl Scout volunteers. Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith events can include participation in worship services, pre- and post-worship events, and service projects.

Why is Girl Scouts doing Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith?

Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith events are a longstanding tradition of Girl Scouts that provide Girl Scouts and their troops with a way to be acknowledged at their house of worship, thank faith partners for their support throughout the year, and honor adult volunteers.

When can I do Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith?

Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith events typically occur during Girl Scout Week, which is the week of March 12 every year. However, Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith events can occur at any mutually agreeable time between your faith partner and you. In 2023, celebration dates include:

- Girl Scout Sunday: Sunday, March 5, 2023
- Girl Scout Jummah: Friday, March 10, 2023
- Girl Scout Sabbath/Shabbat: Friday, March 10–Saturday, March 11, 2023

Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith can be enjoyed with any faith partner on a date of your choosing. Christian and Buddhist partners typically celebrate on Girl Scout Sunday, Muslim partners celebrate on Girl Scout Jummah, and Jewish partners celebrate on Girl Scout Sabbath or Girl Scout Shabbat.

Who is this expected to reach?

Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith events support Girl Scouts and troops of any faith tradition. They also reach faith communities and nonmember families at houses of worship where Girl Scouts Celebrate Faith events occur.

My Promise My Faith (English)



My Promise, My Faith

The Girl Scouts My Promise, My Faith pin invites girls in grades K-12 to experience a faith journey through exploration of the Girl Scout Law and teachings from their faith. Girls can earn this national pin each year.

Steps to earn the pin:

- 1. Choose one line from the Girl Scout Law. Find a story, song, or poem from your faith with the same ideas. Talk with your family or friends about what that line of the Law and the story, song, or poem have in common.
- 2. Find a woman in your own or another faith community. Ask her how she tries to use that line of the Law in her life.
- 3. Gather three inspirational quotes by women that fit with that line of the Girl Scout Law. Put them where you can see them every day!
- 4. Make something to remind you of what you've learned. It might be a drawing, painting, or poster. You could also make up a story or a skit.
- 5. Keep the connection strong. Find out if your faith community offers a recognition program for Girl Scouts. Talk with your friends, family, or a group in your faith community about what you've learned about your faith and Girl Scouting. Ask them to help you live the Law and your faith. Maybe you can show them what you just made or perform your skit!

Adult volunteers from faith organizations partner with girls by:

- Linking the national pin into their faith's religious recognitions
- Guiding girls through their personal faith journey
- Helping girls strengthen their understanding of their faith

My Promise, My Faith Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

Earning the My Promise, My Faith Awards help Girl Scout Daisies through Ambassadors explore how Girl Scouting and their faith offer similar ideas about how to act. Requirements are in The Girl's Guide to Girl Scouting and on GSOC <u>Girl Scouts and Faith</u>.

Is Girl Scouts teaching religion through My Promise, My Faith (MPMF?)

No, Girl Scouts is a secular organization. The Girl Scout Promise and Law are in alignment with many faith organizations' teachings and MPMF and the Girl Scout Leadership Experience (GSLE) provide girls an opportunity to strengthen their faith journey as they grow their leadership skills.

How does the MPMF award relate to the other religious recognitions?

MPMF awards complement faith-based religious recognitions. A girl can choose to earn one or both awards in any order at the appropriate grade level. More information about religious recognitions is found at <u>Girl Scouts of the USA - P.R.A.Y.</u> (praypub.org) or by contacting the faith organizations.

How often can a girl earn the MPMF award?

Every year she is a Girl Scout. She is encouraged to select a different line of the Law each year, although she may choose to repeat a portion of the Law at a different program level as long as the specific activities she does are different or reflect a different level of understanding of the Law or her faith. A girl does not have to have earned the award at a younger grade level to begin earning it, nor is she required to earn it every year.

Where are the MPMF pins worn?

Where can a girl wear her faith's religious recognitions?

Religious recognitions can be worn alongside the MPMF pin or anywhere else she chooses below the MPMF.

How much time does a girl have to complete the award?

Girls can complete MPMF any time during the membership year (October 1 – September 30.).

When is it appropriate to present the MPMF award?

These awards can be presented to girls at any time once they have completed the requirements, but it is more fun and meaningful, if they are presented in a special ceremony or Court of Awards. Also, many faith organizations acknowledge religious recognitions earned by girls in their faith community during Girl Scout Sunday, Girl Scout Jummah, or Girl Scout Shabbat. The MPMF recognition can be incorporated into these ceremonies.

How can my troop or service unit develop faith partners?

MPMF has been welcomed by several key national faith organizations. Use MPMF as an opportunity to build and/or strengthen relationships with faith communities.



ni promesa, mi fe

El pin de Girl Scouts Mi promesa, mi fe invita a las niñas de kínder hasta 12.º grado a vivir una experiencia de fe con la Ley de Girl Scout y las enseñanzas de su fe. Las niñas pueden ganarse este pin nacional cada año.

Pasos para ganar el pin:

- 1. Elija una línea de la Ley de Girl Scout. Encuentre una historia, una canción o un poema de su fe con las mismas ideas. Hable con su familia o amigos sobre las similitudes de esa línea de la Ley y el cuento, la canción o el poema.
- 2. Encuentre a una mujer que sea de su comunidad de fe u otra. Pregúntele cómo intenta usar esa línea de la Ley en su vida.
- 3. Reúna tres frases inspiradoras de mujeres que cumplen con esa línea de la Ley de Girl Scout. Póngalas en un lugar en donde las pueda ver todos los días.
- 4. Haga algo que le recuerde lo que aprendió. Puede ser un dibujo, pintura o póster. También puede crear una historia o una escena.
- 5. Mantenga una buena conexión. Averigüe si su comunidad de fe ofrece un programa de reconocimiento para las Girl Scouts. Hable con sus amigos, familia o grupo de su comunidad de fe sobre lo que ha aprendido de esta y de su tiempo con las Girl Scouts. Pídales que le ayuden a vivir según la Ley y su fe. Quizá pueda mostrarles lo que acaba de hacer o su escena.

Los voluntarios adultos de las organizaciones de fe participan con las niñas:

- · Relacionando el pin nacional con los reconocimientos de fe de su religión.
- Guiando a las niñas en su viaje personal de fe.
- · Ayudando a las niñas a reforzar su comprensión de la fe.

Ghim cài Lời Hứa Của Tôi, Đức Tin Của Tôi của Hội Nữ Hướng Đạo khuyến khích nữ sinh từ lớp K-12 tham gia trải nghiệm hành trình đức tin bằng cách nghiên cứu Luật Nữ Hướng Đạo và giáo lý tôn giáo của các em. Hàng năm, nữ sinh đều có thể nhận được ghim cài của quốc gia này.

Các bước để nhận ghim cài:

- 1. Chon một dòng từ Luật Nữ Hướng Đạo. Tìm một câu chuyển, bài hát hoặc bài thơ từ đức tin của các em với chủ để liên quan đến dòng Luật. Chia sẻ với gia đình hoặc bạn bè của các em về điểm chung giữa dòng luật đó với câu chuyện, bài hát hoặc bài thơ đã tìm.
- 2. Tìm gặp một người phụ nữ từ cộng đồng tín ngưỡng của các em hoặc từ một cộng đồng tín ngưỡng khác. Hãy hỏi người đó xem họ đã cố gắng vận dụng dòng Luật đó như thế nào trong cuộc sống của mình.
- 3. Tìm ba câu nói truyền cảm hứng của phụ nữ có liên quan đến dòng luật trong Luật Nữ Hướng Đao. Dán những câu nói này ở nơi mà các em có thể nhìn thấy hàng ngày!
- 4. Tạo thứ gì đó để gợi nhớ về những gì mà các em đã học được. Đó có thể là một bức vẽ, bức hội họa hoặc áp phích. Các em cũng có thể sáng tạo một câu chuyện hoặc một tiểu phẩm.
- 5. Đảm bảo mối liên hệ chặt chẽ. Tìm hiểu xem cộng đồng đức tin của các em có chương trình công nhận Hội Nữ Hướng Đạo hay không. Chia sẻ những gi đã học được về đức tin của mình và Phong Trào Nữ Hướng Đạo với bạn bè, gia đình hoặc một nhóm trong cộng đồng đức tin của các em. Nhờ họ giúp các em trong việc tuần thủ Luật và đức tin của mình. Các em có thể cho họ xem những gì các em vừa làm hoặc biểu diễn tiểu phẩm của bạn!

Tình nguyện viên trưởng thành từ các tổ chức dựa trên đức tin có thể giúp đỡ các em theo những cách sau:

- Gắn kết ghim cài của quốc gia với chương trình công nhận tôn giáo của các em
- Hướng dẫn nữ sinh với hành trình đức tin của riêng từng em
- Hỗ trợ nữ sinh hiểu sâu hơn về đức tin của mình

How do we get started on these programs?

- 1. Girls must obtain the specific booklet for their religion.
- · Check with your council store or contact the religious organization directly (see list above).
- Each girl needs her own booklet to document progress.
- · Some religions offer adult manuals for counselors and mentors.
- 2. Parents should review the program guidelines.
- · Some programs require that girls be official "members" of the religious institution.
- Age/grade requirements vary from program to program.
- Each program sets its own guidelines as to who may serve as counselor. Some programs require clergy to serve as counselor, other programs allow parents or other family members to serve as counselor.
- 3. Families should talk to their religious leaders and show them the booklet before beginning any program.
 - · Most programs require that they be completed under the auspices of that religious organization.
- · Many programs require a religious leader's signature.
- 4. Girls must complete the requirements, obtain the proper signatures, and follow the instructions to order the recognition or pin.
- These recognitions or pins are not available in your Girl Scout store (follow the instructions in your booklet).
- The award should be presented in a meaningful ceremony, preferably in the girl's religious institution.
- · The award can be presented at anytime of the year. (Don't forget: Girl Scout Sunday/Sabbath is in March.)


