STEM

Girl Scouts nationally has pledged to bring 2.5 million girls into the STEM pipeline by 2025. Together, Girl Scouts of the USA and Girl Scouts of Orange County are developing the next generation of female leaders in **science, technology, engineering, and math**.

In 2019, **7,945** OC Girl Scouts in kindergarten through 12th grades earned badges in STEM and **1,085** girls participated in council-run STEM events, including Girl Scouts of Orange County's annual STEM Expo at California State University, Fullerton and career exploration with Titan Lab Adventures, Ericsson's Summer Connect robotics event, and a beach cleanup and weather education program hosted by Surfline and organized by Girl Scouts of Orange County's volunteer STEM Patrol.

STEM Consortium inspires Girl Scouts at all levels to embrace STEM

OC STEM jobs are growing, yet our region continues to face a shortfall of STEM-educated workers. Women remain widely under-represented in most STEM professions, with females filling only 28 percent of STEM jobs nationally.

The Girl Scouts of Orange County STEM Consortium, founded in 2015, inspires girls to embrace science, technology, engineering, and math, understand the role of STEM in their lives, and learn how STEM can be part of their future careers. To date, over 1,900 Orange County Girl Scouts have earned the My STEM Life badge (for grades 6-8) launched in 2015 and 1.349 have earned the STEMsational ME! badge (for grades 4-5) launched in 2016. Both badges were created by the Girl Scouts of Orange County STEM Consortium and are available only to OC Girl Scouts. More than 600 girls have participated in interactive events and workshops hosted by STEM Consortium members since its founding

Thanks to the generosity of STEM Consortium members, Girl Scouts are exploring many aspects of STEM and recognizing the importance and power of STEM for their future success. They are also developing vital skills prized by today's employers, such as problem solving, project planning, and critical thinking.

From the backyard to the backcountry, Girl Scouts have plenty of **opportunities to create their own outdoor adventures** and **develop a lifelong appreciation of nature**. When Girl Scouts get outside, they become better problem solvers, develop leadership skills, and become team players who care about protecting our environment.

Getting Girls Outdoors

In 2019, 7,813 Girl Scouts in K-12 grades earned Outdoors badges and awards, many of whom participated in Girl Scouts of Orange County's signature outdoor offerings, such as Summer and Weekend Camps, Day Camp, beginner to advanced hiking, and GAM (Gathering of All Mariners).

Nearly 1,585 Girl Scouts ages 5-17 attended volunteer-run, girl-led Day Camps, where they were introduced to outdoor adventure, connected with older Girl Scout mentors, made friends, and had fun!



Whether it's through **exercising and staying healthy**, developing **strong relationships** with family and peers, **advocating** on behalf of others, protecting our environment, or **exploring careers** that can truly change the world for the better, Girl Scouts gain the skills and inspiration to accept challenges, overcome obstacles, and take the lead.

In 2019, Orange County Girl Scouts in K-12 grades earned more than 22,000 badges and awards in the area of Life Skills. Girl Scouts of Orange County also collaborated with organizations across Orange County to offer 35 unique Life Skills events.

NATIONAL GOLD AWARD GIRL SCOUTS

Girl Scouts of Orange County is proud to recognize Megan Loh and Isabella Madrigal, as two of ten 2019 National Gold Award Girl Scouts – an honor bestowed annually by Girl Scouts of the USA. Their projects demonstrated extraordinary leadership, had a measurable and sustainable impact, and addressed a challenge related to a national and/or global issue.

MEGAN LOH GEARup4Youth

Megan addressed the under representation of women in technology careers by forming GEARup4Youth, a nonprofit that supports girls' interests in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) and encourages them to pursue related career paths. She initiated the first girls-only robotics classes at local Boys & Girls Clubs and partnered with over 200 organizations—from national STEM groups and the LA County of Education to children's museums and public libraries—to host presentations, family STEM events, and expos sharing her technology curriculum. Megan also published a book, Easy STEM Activities You *Can Do at Home!*, which reached a broad audience and stimulated more interest in STEM. GEARup4Youth has



benefited 13,500 girls to date and is continuing to make a difference in the lives of thousands of children.

Megan says:

"Through my Gold Award project, I've gained the friendship of volunteers who share my passion, and I've captured the love of girls I've taught. Inspiring future STEM leaders has shown me that people of different backgrounds, cultures, and languages can learn and thrive through their shared passion for technology."

ISABELLA MADRIGAL Cultural Strengthening Through Native American Storytelling

A member of the Cahuilla tribe, actress and storyteller Isabella struggled to find roles on stage that fit her own experiences. To address the lack of indigenous peoples' representation in the U.S. media and cultural narrative, Isabella wrote, directed, and performed in the play *Menil and*

Her Heart about missing and murdered indigenous women. Her fellow actors included Native American tribal members and community participants she brought together through workshops, which introduced them to the art of performance, traditional stories, and the need for activism to address social injustices for indigenous peoples. Isabella's work included collaborating with ethnic playwrights Diana Burbano and Kimberley Guerrero and the Dorothy Ramon Learning Center to bring her play to life. She also received a Dragon Kim Fellowship, which made it possible for Isabella to bring her play to stages across Southern California, including Pala Resort and Casino, Redlands University, Sherman Indian School, and the San Diego State California Genocide Conference.

Isabella says:

"Girl Scouts has given me the opportunity to find my own voice and speak on behalf of marginalized and overlooked missing and murdered indigenous women and girls. Leadership entails bringing to light complex, emotional, and intense issues, because if no one does anything, nothing will change."

Voice for Girls

Over 240 attendees, including educators across Orange County, gathered for Girl Scouts of Orange County's eighth annual Voice for Girls forum in May of 2019 to discuss advancing diversity and gender equality in the workplace. Keynote L. Song Richardson, Dean and Chancellor's Professor of Law at the UCI School of Law, explored unconscious bias and provided attendees with tools for fostering equitable work environments that welcome varied perspectives. Dean Richardson advised girls to "tell yourself that you are amazing and that you can do it - the brain will follow."

Following the keynote, guests listened in as Girl Scout Alum and Vice President of Operations for Continuum Advisory, LLC Alina Lee Santiago interviewed four local Girl Scouts – Marysol Cázarez (16, from Santa Ana), Isabella Madrigal (16, from Temecula), Khira Mistry (18, from Placentia), and Natalie Salvatierra (15, from Tustin). The Girl Scouts provided unique insights into their own experiences with bias and the corporate culture they will be looking to join when they enter the workforce. Attendees left empowered to create a future where there are no limits to what girls and women can achieve.

The inspiring event was emceed by Tricia Wedekind, a lifelong Girl Scout, and Girl Scouts of Orange County's Outdoor Program Manager and Camp Director Erin Johnson. Among those honored was 14-year-old Ava Kopecky, who received the Girl Scout Medal of Honor for saving the life of a drowning boy. Over 369 girls and 137 adult volunteers were recognized for the many ways they make the world a better place, each and every day.

Volunteer Conference

Over 400 passionate and dedicated volunteers, staff, exhibitors, and Girl Scouts gathered at Chapman University in Orange for Girl Scouts of Orange County's annual Volunteer Conference. Held in August, the conference featured 45 workshops, 40 presenters, 23 community exhibitors, and one dynamic keynote by GSOC CEO Vikki Shepp. Topics ranged from Highest Award training to Wilderness Survival and Guiding Girls to Astronomy. 
