- Earn Girl Scout Journey Awards when they complete a Journey Take Action Project
- Develop leadership skills: project management, communication skills, and more
- Prepare to earn the Girl Scouts' Highest Awards: Bronze, Silver, and Gold

When a girl completes a Take Action Project, she teams up with others to:

- Identify a problem
- Brainstorm solutions
- Create a plan
- Put the plan into action
- Talk about what she learned – and what she can't wait to do next!
