The Girl Scout Gold Award

The Girl Scout Gold Award represents the highest achievement in Girl Scouting; it recognizes girls in grades 9 through 12 who demonstrate extraordinary leadership through sustainable and measurable "Take Action" projects. Since 1916, girls have successfully answered the call to "Go Gold," an act that indelibly marks them as accomplished members of their communities and the world.

An applicant must become a registered Girl Scout member and complete components that help her build skills in leadership, communication, time management, presentation, delegation, interpersonal relationships, responsibility and commitment. She explores and demonstrates setting short and long-term goals while developing her own self-potential and values. She then combines all of the skills gained through this process to design, plan, implement and evaluate a project that makes a significant difference in her community. This process takes two to four years to complete.

The outstanding young women featured in this yearbook have demonstrated their courage, confidence, and character by earning the Girl Scout Gold Award, the highest award that can be achieved in Girl Scouts. Members of Girl Scouts of Orange County salute these dedicated and determined young women for making the world a better place through their fulfillment of the requirements for the Girl Scout Gold Award.

Over the course of four months Grace taught the students the problems and how STEM can be used to solve everyday problems. A pre and post interest survey revealed that the students were significantly more interested in STEM careers at the end of Grace's program.

Later, she continued to hold multiple educational sessions, which included guest speakers and cancer survivors to speak about their stories, in order to spread awareness about the cause. Afterwards, she taught students how to make pillows as a form of outreach to support undergoing patients.



Upon Council approval, she met with day-care directors and formulated the weekly activities; she also created her own budget, shopped for supplies, and trained volunteer aides. Every week she read a different fable/poem with the children and then led them in crafts, or games related to it. In the end, all of the participants walked away with a broadened base of literature and vocabulary and a love of reading.




